REPORT ON CASA CONFERENCE AUG 10-12, 2022 AT RESORT AT SQUAW CREEK

- 1. CSRMA Board Meeting. The Board voted to increase the minimum deductible for sewer inflows into homes incidents to \$25,000 from the current \$10,000. (Comment from D. Merrill—I think this means it is even more important to change our regulations to require backflow prevention devices on all laterals.) The Board voted to offer a discount on wrongful termination insurance to all districts which have two hours of training for all supervisory employees every two years about termination practices. (Comment from D. Merrill--sounds nice but there are not enough hours in a year for all the training and reporting we have to do.) Board approved continued exploration of a "captive" insurance company which could invest in more equities to generate bigger returns. Property insurance costs are going up around 24%--rates up 13% and value of property have inflated so total cost up 24% (not final). I suggest Rex print out the agenda packet so our board members can see how CSRMA is doing; worker's comp in particular has to build up reserves due to a few large claims in the recent past.
- 2. Tracking Plastics. This panel discussion discussed mainly sampling microplastics (smaller than 1 mm but larger than 5000 micrometer.) ASTM std method required some modification to work for continuous sampling.
- 3. New Sanitary Sewer System Waste Discharge Requirements (SSS WDR). Will require more training—tailgates only won't cut it. Try to do more than the minimum; this will give you some "resilience" if one part doesn't pass muster. Some clear issues: self audits must be performed every two years on all your overflow reports, and you should find problems, like, for example, a report of a spill with no picture of the overflowing manhole so the estimate of the overflow can't be confirmed. Another issue will be risk assessments where smaller agencies will not have the expertise to prepare such assessments.
- 4. Wastewater based epidemiology. Prof. Alexandria Boehm, Stanford University, discussed her work which is now being used to track COVID-19, and she has extended it to polio and monkeypox. One interesting point is that the liquid portion of the influent has 10 to the 0 or 1 detectable virus RNA particles and the solid portion has 10 to the 4 or 5 virus RNA particles per gram, so the tests are carried out on the solid portion. Results are rapid and correlate well with actual illness often giving a two week lead over actual case detections. Although local agencies have been working with her, she has encountered some hesitancy around the country. Members of the audience said they were concerned that the public might fear that the POTW outflow might be infectious. She said she couldn't guarantee that, she hasn't studied that issue, but the detections are of portions of the viruses and there is no indication that they are still infectious, and much less so after primary and secondary treatment. The other concern the listeners suggested was that resort areas in particular wouldn't want this data released because it might scare away visitors if it were known that the area was a hot bed of infection.
- 5. PFAS Priorities and Actions. I didn't attend this discussion, it was running concurrently with the SSS WDR panel, but my wife, who spend many years at the USDA analyzing plant toxins with GC-mass spec, went to this session. She reported back that the technology is still not adequate to reliably detect at the parts per trillion level. The results were variable and not reproducible. They also tried looking for C-F bonds, but this didn't tell you what the actual chemical species were. Subsequently at the Fed Leg Committee Meeting, Eric Sapirstein noted that the legislative track and the regulatory track were at odds. The legislative track is ignoring science and regulative rules and procedures.

- 6. Keynote Address. Eugenio Aleman, a Chief Economist at Raymond James, gave an informative talk about our economy and inflation. Bottom line: things aren't that bad and inflation isn't that big a threat. We have had much worse inflation in the 1970's and the long term trends for the USA are favorable.
- 7. Cybersecurity. The speakers were in the business of selling cybersecurity, so I tended to discount some of their recommendations about hiring professionals, but certainly cybersecurity is a real issue and we must remain on our toes. We don't have a POTW to be invaded and we let the county do our billing, but obviously we still have to careful. The new NPDES permits will have cybetrsecurity rules. The future doesn't look all that good. Quantum computing will make encryption vulnerable to attack.
- 8. Workforce Development. Elizabeth Toups from JVS/Baywork talked a little about this program. 28 agencies in the Bay Area are charter members. I did see Novato Sanitary and Oro Loma listed, but not Stege. Perhaps we should participate. Baywork mentors and helps those with some disadvantages become sanitation workers. The other member of the panel, Rowena Holden, talked about issues which can affect workplace satisfaction and performance. Instead of thinking in terms of past performance for performance management, think in terms of performance enhancement for the future.
- 9. We heard from Lara Wyss, leader of the Responsible Flushing Alliance.. Visit flushsmart.org or flushsmartcalifornia.org for information. There have been good results from the education campaigns undertaken, and working with manufactures there have been notable successes, but we have to keep the pressure up.
- 10. State and Federal Updates. There is money! Most of the money is for clean water projects and recycling, but this also frees up many for sewer projects. Each agency is encouraged to consider seeking funds for important projects.

Per Government Code Section 66013(d), the District shall make available to the public, within 180 days after the last day of each fiscal year, the following information for that fiscal year:

District-Wide Sewer Connection Charge - The purposes of the sewer connection charge are (a) to provide revenue to acquire, construct, install and replace capital facilities and other assets required for the District's wastewater disposal system, and (b) to distribute the cost of acquisition, construction, installation and replacement of the District's wastewater facilities and other capital assets so that the owner of each parcel connected to the District's system pays a proportionate share of those costs. Payment of the applicable connection charge allows discharges of wastewater to be made from the respective parcel in an amount that corresponds to the amount of the charge established by the District Ordinance Code. The discharge capacity thus acquired is irrevocable and runs with the parcel.

San Pablo Avenue Specific Plan Area Sewer Connection/Capacity Charge - In September 2017, a special study was completed to help plan for future developments in the San Pablo Avenue Specific Plan Area (SPASPA) in the City of El Cerrito. ("Sewer Capacity Charge for the San Pablo Avenue Specific Plan Area," September 12, 2017, Urban Economics) and an additional updated connection fee study was conducted in April 2019 ("Connection Charge and SPASPA Impact Fee Study"). Without pipe upsizing, the anticipated development in the SPASPA would surcharge existing facilities. An additional capacity charge will fund sewer capacity improvements needed to serve projected growth within the SPASPA. For new connections and increased discharges in the SPASPA, both residential and nonresidential developments will pay an additional fee per fixture unit. For SPASPA developments, these charges must be paid in addition to the District-Wide Sewer Connection Charge.

STEGE SANITARY DISTRICT ENVIRONMENTALLY PREFERABLE PROCUREMENT POLICY

The Stege Sanitary District (District) is committed to minimize negative impacts on public health and the environment in a responsible manner and recognizes that the products and services the District procures have inherent environmental and economic impacts. The District shall make procurement decisions that embody, promote, and encourage the District's commitment to protecting the public's health and the environment and supports goals of sustainability.

The purpose of this policy is to encourage the purchase and use of materials, products, and services that best align with the District's fiscal, performance, and environmental goals. This includes reducing the spectrum of environmental impacts from District use of products, including reduction of greenhouse gas emissions, energy use, reduction of landfill waste, health and safety risks, and resource consumption. Decisions regarding adequacy, suitability, and/or feasibility shall be at the discretion of the District Manager.

DEFINITIONS

- **Biobased** means products that are composed in whole or in significant part, of biological products or renewable agricultural materials (including plant, animal, and marine materials) or forestry materials.
- **Biodegradable** means the ability of a substance to decompose in the natural environments into harmless raw materials.
- **Bisphenols** mean chemicals such as Bisphenol A (BPA), Bisphenol S (BPS), and Bisphenol F (BPF) widely used in polycarbonate plastics, epoxy resins, food packaging, and thermal receipt paper. Some manufacturers have substituted BPA with Bisphenol S (BPS) and Bisphenol F (BPF). These chemicals are less well studied but appear to have similar health effects such as hormone-disruption.
- Chlorofluorocarbons (CFCs) mean any of a group of compounds that contain carbon, chlorine, fluorine, and sometimes hydrogen and have been used as refrigerants, cleaning solvents, aerosol propellants, and in the manufacture of plastic foams.
- Compostable means a product that can be placed into a composition of decaying biodegradable materials and eventually turn into a nutrient-rich material. It is synonymous with "biodegradable", except it is limited to solid materials (liquid products are not considered compostable).
- **Energy Efficient Product** means a product that is in the upper 25 percent of energy efficiency for all similar products, or that is at least 10 percent more efficient than the minimum level meeting US federal government standards.

- Environmentally Preferable Products mean goods and materials that have a less
 adverse impact on public health and the environment when compared with competing
 goods and materials. This comparison shall consider raw materials acquisition,
 production, manufacturing, packaging, distribution, re-use, operation, maintenance, and
 waste management of the good or material.
- Environmentally Preferable Services mean services that have a more beneficial or less adverse impact on public health and the environment when compared with competing services.
- Flame Retardants mean chemicals that are added to products to resist or inhibit the spread of fire. Flame retardant chemicals include, but are not limited to, halogenated, phosphorous-based, nitrogen-based, and nanoscale flame retardants.
- Halogenated Flame Retardants mean chemicals that contain chlorine or bromine bonded to carbon or that are added to products to resist or inhibit the spread of fire. Also known as organohalogen flame retardants. Many of these chemicals have persistent, bioaccumulative, and toxic properties.
- Per or Poly Fluoroalkyl Substances mean chemicals sometimes referred to as PFCs or PFASs; including long- and short-chain per- and poly-fluorinated alkyl compounds and fluorinated polymers. These chemicals are commonly used in products for oil-, stain-, and water-repellent properties. They persist in the environment, have been found as ground and drinking water contaminants. They have been found in 98% of the US population.
- Persistent, Bioaccumulative, Toxic compounds (PBT's) mean toxic chemicals that
 persist in the environment and increase in concentration through food chains as larger
 animals consume PBT-laden smaller animals. They transfer rather easily among air, water,
 and land, and span boundaries of programs, geography, and generations. As a result, PBTs
 pose risks to human health and ecosystems. They include heavy metals and chemicals
 such as mercury, dioxins, and PCB's (polychlorinated biphenyls), as well as certain
 brominated and chlorinated flame retardants.
- Phthalates mean a class of chemicals that are added to some polyvinyl chloride (PVC) plastic products to make them more flexible. They are also added to some glues, caulks, paints, personal care products, and air fresheners. Phthalates may be are-endocrine disruptors.
- Volatile Organic Compounds (VOCs) mean chemicals that readily evaporate and contribute to the formation of air pollution when released into the atmosphere. Some VOCs are classified as toxic and carcinogenic.
- Water Efficient means a product that is in the upper 25 percent of water efficiency for all similar products, or that is at least 10 percent more efficient than the minimum level meeting US federal government standards.

POLICY

The District shall acquire goods and services in a manner that integrates both fiscal responsibility and environmental stewardship. District employees shall comply with this policy and actively encourage decisions that reflect the policy objectives stated herein. Procurement shall actively promote and encourage product and service acquisitions compliant with the policies and guidelines adopted herein.

Environmental factors to be considered in product and service acquisitions include, but not limited to, the assessment of:

- Pollutant releases and toxicants, especially Persistent Bioaccumulative Toxics (PBTs), other chemicals of concern, air emissions, and water pollution;
- Waste generation and waste minimization;
- Greenhouse gas emissions;
- Recyclability and recycled content;
- Energy consumption, energy efficiency, use of renewable energy;
- Depletion of natural resources;
- Potential impact on human health and the environment;
- Impacts on biodiversity;
- Total life cycle costs.

When determining if a product is environmentally preferable, the following environmental attributes should be considered:

- Antimicrobial chemical free;
- Biobased;
- Biodegradable;
- Bisphenol free;
- Chloroflurocarbon (CFC) free;
- Compostable;
- Durable:
- Energy efficient;
- Flame retardant free (especially halogenated flame retardants);
- Heavy metal free (e.g. no lead, mercury, cadmium);
- Low carcinogenic potential;
- Less hazardous;
- Low toxicity;
- Low Volatile Organic Compounds (VOC) content;
- Made from renewable materials;
- Per and Poly Fluoroalkyl free,

- Phthalate free;
- Reduced packaging;
- Reusable;
- Water efficient.

The intent of this policy is to complement the District Code and District Procurement Policy along with applicable State and Federal laws and regulations. When such code or law is updated, or the Board of Directors adopts or amends established policy, this policy shall be considered to likewise incorporate such additional provisions.

RESOLUTION NO. 2204-0822 FINDING THAT THERE IS A PROCLAIMED STATE OF EMERGENCY; FINDING THAT MEETING IN PERSON WOULD PRESENT IMMINENT RISKS TO THE HEALTH OR SAFETY OF ATTENDEES AS A RESULT OF THE STATE OF EMERGENCY; AND AUTHORIZING REMOTE TELECONFERENCED MEETINGS OF THE STEGE SANITARY DISTRICT FOR THE 30 DAY PERIOD BEGINNING AUGUST 18 PURSUANT TO AB 361

ISSUE:

The Board will consider a resolution making necessary findings to continue to meet remotely for another 30-day period pursuant to Assembly Bill 361 (AB 361).

FISCAL IMPACT:

The fiscal impact to continue to meet remotely is minimal.

STRATEGIC PLAN:

GOAL 4: Provide a Safe and Rewarding Work Environment that Recognizes the Worth and Value of Employees

BACKGROUND:

On September 16, 2021, Governor Gavin Newsom signed AB 361 which allows public agencies to continue to meet remotely when there is a declared State of Emergency and pursuant to certain procedural requirements. AB 361 essentially allows the District to continue to meet remotely under similar circumstances as under the Governor's Executive Order N-29-20, allowing local agencies to meet remotely. The teleconferencing provisions of Executive Order N-29-20 expired on September 30.

AB 361 allows the following:

- While maintaining transparency and public access, local agencies would be able to meet remotely during a declared state of emergency
- While agencies would still be required to post agendas and meeting information, agencies would not be required to post meeting notices and/or agendas at all teleconference locations when remotely meeting during an emergency
- While the public must continue to have access to the remote meeting and provided the ability to make public comment, agencies would not be required to make all remote meeting sites accessible to the public, nor include the remote location details in the meeting notice or agenda during a declared state of emergency
- Additionally, agency board members would not be required to be at remote sites within the territorial bounds of the agency during a declared state of emergency

Since September 23, 2021, pursuant to AB 361, the Board has approved recurring resolutions authorizing remote teleconferenced meetings for a 30-day period.

Pursuant to AB 361, a draft resolution to extend remote teleconferenced meetings for another 30-day period is attached for the Board's consideration.

RESOLUTION FINDING THAT THERE IS A PROCLAIMED STATE OF EMERGENCY; FINDING THAT MEETING IN PERSON WOULD PRESENT IMMINENT RISKS TO THE HEALTH OR SAFETY OF ATTENDEES AS A RESULT OF THE STATE OF EMERGENCY; AND AUTHORIZING REMOTE TELECONFERENCED MEETINGS OF THE STEGE SANITARY DISTRICT FOR THE 30 DAY PERIOD BEGINNING AUGUST 18 PURSUANT TO AB 361

The Directors of the Stege Sanitary District (District) find and determine as follows:

- A. All meetings of the District are open and public, as required by the Ralph M. Brown Act (Cal. Gov. Code 54950 54963), so that any member of the public may attend, participate, and watch the District conduct its business; and.
- B. On March 4, 2020, Governor Newsom declared a State of Emergency to make additional resources available, formalize emergency actions already underway across multiple state agencies and departments, and help the State prepare for a broader spread of the novel coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19).
- C. On March 17, 2020, in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-29-20 suspending certain provisions of the Ralph M. Brown Act in order to allow local legislative bodies to conduct meetings telephonically or by other means.
- D. As a result of Executive Order N-29-20, staff set up virtual meetings for all Board meetings.
- E. On June 11, 2021, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-08-21, which, effective September 30, 2021, ends the provisions of Executive Order N-29-20 that allows local legislative bodies to conduct meetings telephonically or by other means.
- F. On September 16, 2021, the Governor signed AB 361 (2021) which allows for local legislative bodies and advisory bodies to continue to conduct meetings via teleconferencing under specified conditions and includes a requirement that the Board make specified findings. AB 361 (2021) took effect immediately.

- G. AB 361 (2021) requires that the Governor declare a State of Emergency pursuant to Government Code section 8625.
- H. AB 361 (2021) further requires that state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, or, requires that the legislative body determines that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health and safety of attendees.
- I. Such conditions now exist in the District, specifically, Governor Newsom has declared a State of Emergency due to COVID-19.
- J. Since issuing Executive Order N-08-21, the highly contagious Delta and Omicron variants of COVID-19 have emerged, causing an increase in COVID-19 cases throughout the State and Contra Costa County.
- K. On August 2, 2021, in response to the Delta variant of COVID-19, the Contra Costa County Health Officer issued an order for nearly all individuals to wear masks when inside public spaces and on September 14, 2021, issued an order requiring operators of specified dining establishments, entertainment venues and fitness facilities to restrict entry based on COVID-19 vaccination status or testing.
- L. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention ("CDC") continues to recommend physical distancing of at least 6 feet from others outside of the household and the Contra Costa County Health Officer strongly recommends online meetings and distancing.
- M. The highly contagious Omicron variant and sub-variants have resulted in the greatest nationwide infection rate since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic; and
- N. Because of the rise in cases due to the Omicron variant and sub-variant of COVID-19, the District is concerned about the health and safety of all individuals who intend to attend Board meetings.
- O. On September 23, 2021, the Board found that the presence of COVID-19 and the increase of cases due to the Delta variant would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees, including the Board and staff, should the Board hold in person meetings; and

- P. The Board hereby finds that the presence of COVID-19 and the increase of cases due to the Omicron variant and sub-variants would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees, including the Board and staff, should the Board hold in person meetings.
- Q. The District shall ensure that its meetings comply with the provisions required by AB 361 (2021) for holding teleconferenced meetings.

In consideration of the foregoing findings and determinations, it is resolved:

- 1. The foregoing recitals are true and correct and are hereby incorporated by reference
- 2. In compliance with AB 361 (2021), and in order to continue to conduct teleconference meetings without complying with the usual teleconference meeting requirements of the Brown Act, the Board makes the following continued findings:
 - a) The Board has considered the circumstances of the state of emergency; and
 - b) The state of emergency, as declared by the Governor, continues to directly impact the ability of the Board, as well as staff and members of the public, from meeting safely in person; and
 - c) The CDC continues to recommend physical distancing of at least six feet due to COVID-19 and the Contra Costa County Health Officer strongly recommends online meetings and distancing. As a result of the presence of COVID-19 and the increase of cases due to the Omicron variant and sub-variants, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees, the Board, and staff.
- 3. The Board may continue to meet remotely in compliance with AB 361, in order to better ensure the health and safety of the public.
- 4. The Board will revisit the need to conduct meetings remotely within 30 days of the adoption of this resolution.

CONSIDERATION OF CLASS III EASEMENT ENCROACHMENT – 265 ARLINGTON AVE., KENSINGTON, CA

ISSUE:

Linda Pham, property owner of 265 Arlington Avenue in Kensington, is requesting a class III easement encroachment for an existing detached garage structure that encroaches on District sewer main lines in an easement on her property in order to apply for a permit with the Contra Costa County to convert the garage into a new accessory dwelling unit (ADU).

FISCAL IMPACT:

In order to complete any sanitary sewer main repair or replacement, the District may have to bear liability for any damage caused to this structure, if the structure is allowed to remain on top of the sewer easement.

STRATEGIC PLAN:

GOAL 2: Maintain and Improve Infrastructure

WORK PLAN ITEM "b": Update and implement sewer system master plan to prioritize sewer replacement, funding, and maintain a sewer system life cycle of 60+ years by June 2020 and at least every two (2) years thereafter.

BACKGROUND:

Linda Pham, property owner of 265 Arlington Avenue in Kensington wishes to convert the existing detached garage on her property into a new ADU. However, this garage is 3-4 feet away from the sewer main line and therefore is within the sewer easement located on her property.

The property owner is requesting a class III easement encroachment in order to apply for a permit with the Contra Costa County to convert the garage into a new ADU.

As per District Ordinance No. 1793-0602,

6.2 Except as provided in Section 7, Class Two and Class Three Encroachments are not authorized and shall not be maintained or permitted on District easements.

District staff considers the existing detached garage structure as a class 3 encroachment. In addition, the remodel improvements proposed by the property owner further exacerbates the District's potential liability should any damage occur to this proposed ADU structure as part of regular maintenance, repair, or replacement of the existing sewer structures.

1.3 Class Three. Encroachments which will cause significant interference with District easements. Examples may include permanent structures such as buildings, swimming pools, permanent decks, retaining walls and reinforced concrete or masonry; temporary structures which are not readily removable from the easement; also trees, heavy brush, and vegetation that prevents District access to its facilities in the easement; also any activities and conditions that are unlawful or prohibited by this Ordinance or by other applicable laws.

The sanitary sewer main is approximately 3-4 feet away from the structure's foundation. The sanitary sewer main is HDPE replaced in 2014.

Encroachments must be at least 5 feet from the centerline of sanitary sewer mains (outline the sewer easement), or else any plan check review will be rejected.

The District has no prior record of plan check reviews associated with this property.

RECOMMENDATION:

Reject the property owner's request for a Class 3 Encroachment.

ALTERNATIVES:

- 1. Propose that the homeowner remove the detached garage from the sewer easement.
- 2. Take no action and provide staff direction.

Paul,

Hello! Thank you for taking the time to speak with me about my garage remodel.

As we discussed, I am planning a remodel of my existing detached garage to become a small ADU, as encouraged by the California state law to increase availability of affordable housing. The conversion of accessory structures, such as garages, sheds, and barns, into ADUs is permitted and promoted through the state ADU law.

These conversions of accessory structures are not subject to any additional development standards, such as unit size, height, and lot coverage requirements.

The garage currently sits close to the N and E lot lines. I recently learned of the sewer mains running through my N and E neighbors' properties.

The sewer mains are estimated to be 3-4 feet from the N and E walls of the existing garage. They are approximately 4 feet in depth.

I am requesting a variance to Stege ordinance code 793-0602 for encroachment easement.

The garage has been in its present location for nearly 100 years. In that time, repair work has been done on the sewer mains without any problem. And since the sewer mains are not deep, a wide trench is unlikely to be needed for future repair work.

I have attached a photo showing the sewer line markings running along the N property line. It runs at an angle and the sewer main continues with increasing distance from my garage structure into the neighboring backyard.

I am also attaching the current architectural site plan (File 1) which shows the placement of the garage in the NE corner of the lot. The attached architectural drawing (File 2) shows how shifting the garage structure 5 feet from the N and E sewer lines would put the structure so close to the existing house that the doors would barely swing open without hitting the back steps of the house.

Unfortunately, compliance with the 5 foot setback is prohibitive for this garage remodel because of the small lot size. I am requesting Grandfather Relief for a Class Three Encroachment because the existing garage placement has not impeded sewer repair work since it was constructed in 1926 and is unlikely to interfere with future sewer repair work.

The sewer mains run behind the fences through the neighbors' properties and there is sufficient clearance to accommodate necessary repair work.

Please let me know if any additional information is needed.




Shows approximate locations on sanitary sewer mains and structures

ORDINANCE NO. 1793-0602

ORDINANCE (1) AMENDING POLICIES, STANDARDS AND REQUIREMENTS FOR DISTRICT EASEMENTS AND REGULATING EASEMENT ENCROACHMENTS, AND (2) RESCINDING ORDINANCE NO. 1726-1299

The Board of Directors of Stege Sanitary District finds and determines:

- A. On December 16, 1999, the Board adopted Ordinance No. 1726-1299, an "Ordinance Establishing Policies, Standards and Requirements for District Easements and Regulating Easement Encroachments."
- B. Amendments to Ordinance No. 1726-1299 are necessary and desirable and will be best accomplished by rescinding Ordinance No. 1726-1299 in its entirety and adopting this Ordinance in its place.

In consideration of the foregoing findings and determinations,

IT IS ORDAINED by the Board of Directors of Stege Sanitary District as follows:

- 1. <u>Definitions.</u> For the purposes of this Ordinance, the following terms have the meanings specified below:
 - 1.1 "Easement" means a property right, however created, by which the owner of the right is entitled to make specified uses of the real property of another person; "easement" include, "reserve," "sewer reserve," or "utility reserve".
 - 1.2 "Wastewater facilities" means pipelines, pump stations, or any other structures, equipment and machinery, including appurtenances to them, which are used to collect, convey, treat, dispose of and reuse wastewater.
 - 1.3 "Encroachment" means an activity or condition which results in interference with the rights of the owner of an easement. As used in this Ordinance with respect to District easements, there are three classes of encroachments:
 - Class One. Encroachments which interfere only slightly with District casements. Examples may include loose paving stones and similar landscaping features, flowerbeds, small shrubs, lawn and ground covers which do not impede normal use and operation of District wastewater facilities and may readily be removed and restored at a modest cost if access to the facilities is required.

Class Two. Encroachments which will cause significant interference with District easements but which, due to being readily removable or by virtue of District mandated safeguards and/or mitigation measures, the interference can be ameliorated to an acceptable level. Examples may include fences, gates, driveways, paving, portable or readily removable

structures, larger vegetation whose roots do not have a propensity to invade wastewater facilities, and cuts and fills.

<u>Class Three.</u> Encroachments which will cause significant interference with District easements. Examples may include permanent structures such as buildings, swimming pools, permanent decks, retaining walls and reinforced concrete or masonry; temporary structures which are not readily removable from the easement; also trees, heavy brush, and vegetation that prevents District access to its facilities in the easement; also any activities and conditions that are unlawful or prohibited by this Ordinance or by other applicable laws.

- 1.4 "Significant interference" means, with respect to encroachments on District easements, an activity or condition which has the potential to impede access to or damage District wastewater facilities or which will result in excess of one person-hour of effort by the District to use the easement for its intended purposes.
- 2. <u>District Policies Concerning Easements.</u> The following are District policies concerning easements:
 - 2.1 Wherever feasible, District-owned wastewater facilities shall be located on lands owned by the District, public lands to which the District has largely unrestricted access or in public streets, roads, highways or other public rights of way in which, by law, the District is entitled to construct, install, operate and maintain its facilities.
 - 2.2 District-owned wastewater facilities shall not be located and permanently installed on or in private property, unless the District has acquired an easement or easements for the facilities conforming to this Ordinance. Temporary installations may be made pursuant to a license or other similar authorization approved by the District.
 - 2.3 The location of District wastewater facilities, as described in Section 2.1, is strongly preferred over the type of location described in Section 2.2.
 - 2.4 In furtherance of the policy stated in Section 2.3, District wastewater facilities should not be installed in easements over private property unless:
 - 2.4.1 Installation in a Section 2.1 location is not possible, would be impracticable or would be unduly burdensome; and
 - 2.4.2 The District's easement rights shall be sufficient to enable the District to operate and maintain its facilities without excessive cost or other undue difficulty.
 - 2.5 Subject to its right to abandon or relinquish ownership of any wastewater facilities which are no longer in use and which are not required for future District

needs, the District claims that as of the effective date of this Ordinance, it has acquired and owns easement rights for all District wastewater facilities which are located in or on private property, whether or not the District's easement rights are evidenced by a recorded written instrument or other writing providing notice of the District's claimed easement rights.

3. Creation of District Easements

- 3.1 District easements may be created in any manner allowed by law so long as the easement has been approved and accepted by the District.
- 3.2 Notwithstanding Section 3.1 above, easements to be conveyed to the District should ordinarily be created by express grant or reservation in a written instrument eligible for recordation in official records of the County of Contra Costa. The form and content of the instrument shall be acceptable to the District but shall not be effective until the instrument has been duly delivered to, approved and accepted by the District.

4. <u>Minimum Standards for Easements</u>

- 4.1 Unless expressly waived by the District for good cause, an easement conveyed to the District shall be subject to the following minimum standards:
 - 4.1.1 For the purpose of exercising its principal easement rights, the District shall also be afforded the right of ingress and egress to, from, along, on, in, above and below the surface of the land encompassed by the easement.
 - 4.1.2 The easement shall be subject to the provisions of this Ordinance and to other rules and regulations promulgated by the District.
 - 4.1.3. In the case of easements for pipelines, the easement shall have a horizontal width of not less than ten (10) feet
- 4.2 Easements shall be for the exclusive benefits of the District or they may be non-exclusive. If the easement is nonexclusive, other users of the territory encompassed by the easement shall be prohibited from interfering with the District's easement rights.
- 5. Unlawful Acts. It is unlawful for any person to:
 - 5.1 Cause or permit an unauthorized encroachment on a District easement;
 - 5.2 After notice, fail to abate or otherwise remove or discontinue any action or condition which results in an unauthorized encroachment;
 - 5.3 Abandon any items of property, including motor vehicles, on or within a District easement;

- 5.4 Deposit any debris, garbage, trash, toxic substance, liquid or solid waste or other form of refuse on or within a District easement;
- 5.5 Cause, permit or maintain any activity or condition off or outside the territory of a District easement which causes directly or indirectly a significant interference with the District's easement rights; or
- 5.6 Cause or permit any activity or condition on or within a District easement which constitutes a public or private nuisance.

6. Authorized and Unauthorized Encroachments

- 6.1 A property owner may make use of the land over which the District has an easement if those uses do not result in significant interference with the easement.
- 6.2 Except as provided in Section 7, Class Two and Class Three Encroachments are not authorized and shall not be maintained or permitted on District easements.
- 6.3 The owner of the property over which the District has an easement and any other person who has caused or permitted an unauthorized encroachment to exist is obligated to promptly remove and eliminate the encroachment.
- 7. <u>Encroachment Permits.</u> The owner of a property over which the District has an easement who wishes to maintain a Class Two Encroachment or to obtain Grandfather Relief for a Class Three Encroachment, shall apply for and obtain a District Encroachment Pennit. No permit is required for a Class One Encroachment.
 - 7.1 The District shall establish and the applicant shall comply with such procedures as are required to process and act on the application, including payment of applicable fees, completion of approved application forms, and submission of specified information needed to evaluate the application.

7.2 An Encroachment Permit shall be issued if:

- 7.2.1 The applicant has fully complied with all District requirements and procedures pertaining to issuance of the Permit;
- 7.2.2 The applicant has accepted and agreed to all conditions upon which the Permit is proposed to be issued (see Section 8);
- 7.2.3 With respect to Class Two Encroachments, the District finds that as conditioned, the Permit shall ensure that the Class Two Encroachments authorized by the permit will not result in significant interference with the District's easement; and
- 7.2.4 With respect to Grandfathered Class Three Encroachments, the District finds that as conditioned, the Permit shall to the greatest extent

reasonably possible preserve the District's easement rights while at the same time, in the interests of fairness and substantial justice, make appropriate allowances for justifiable concerns of the property owner. (See Sections 8 and 10.) Under no circumstances shall a Class Three Encroachment be eligible for Grandfathering if:

- 7.2.4.1 Grandfathering could result in a violation of any statute, regulation, order or other provision of law promulgated or enacted by a federal, state or local government entity having jurisdiction over the matter in question;
- 7.2.4.2 Grandfathering would be materially detrimental to the public health, safety and welfare; or
- 7.2.4.3 Grandfathering would result in undue hardship to other persons.
- 8. <u>Encroachment Permit Conditions.</u> The District shall not issue an Encroachment Permit unless conditioned as follows:
 - 8.1 The applicant shall be obliged to fully perform and satisfy all conditions of the Permit;
 - 8.2 When required by the District, the applicant shall cooperate with the District and shall execute a written instrument in recordable form which, when recorded by the District, will place on public record provisions of the Permit which are intended to be known and binding upon any person who succeeds to ownership of an interest in the real property which is subject to the District's easement;
 - 8.3 The permit shall be subject to all of the provisions of this Ordinance;
 - 8.4 With respect to Class Two Encroachments, the Permit shall be conditioned so as to mitigate the effects of the encroachment and safeguard the District's easement rights such that the effect of the mitigation measures and safeguards shall prevent the encroachment from causing significant interference with the District's easement; and
 - 8.5 With respect to Grandfathered Class Three Encroachments, the Permit shall include conditions, which, to the extent reasonably possible under the circumstances, will:
 - 8.5.1 Eliminate the encroachment in due course; and
 - 8.5.2 Until eliminated, alleviate the impacts of the encroachment on the District's easement by requiring mitigation measures and/or safeguards and/or by shifting to the property owner and/or other responsible parties

any financial detriment which may be suffered by the District due to the existence of the activity or conditions.

- 9. Other Regulations. By resolution of the District's Board of Directors adopted from time to time, as the Board deems necessary and appropriate, the District may promulgate and amend rules, regulations and procedures to implement the provisions of this Ordinance, including the following:
 - 9.1 Establish rules, regulations, and procedures concerning applications for and issuance of Encroachment Permits;
 - 9.2 Set fees and charges for District services related to easements;
 - 9.3 List and categorize activities and conditions which constitute encroachments; and
 - 9.4 Establish standard Encroachment Permit conditions applicable to specific activities and conditions including mitigation measures, safeguards and similar provisions.
- 10. <u>Grandfathering.</u> A ClassThree Encroachment which was in existence prior to the effective date of this Ordinance may be maintained and shall not be subject to immediate mandatory removal if the encroachment is Grandfathered pursuant to this Section. An encroachment shall be Grandfathered if the applicant has applied for and obtained an Encroachment Permit pursuant to Section 7.2.4 of this Ordinance.
- 11. Removal and Restoration of Improvements Which are Disturbed by District Activities. Whenever District activities in District easements result in the need for improvements or other activities or conditions of the real property subject to the easement to be removed or otherwise disturbed, the following provisions shall apply:
 - 11.1 Conditions and Activities Not Constituting Unauthorized Encroachments. The District may, at the expense of the District, temporarily remove or discontinue the activity or condition, and upon completion of the District's activities, the District shall, at the District's expense, restore the activity or condition in kind.
 - 11.2 Encroachments Authorized by Permit. If the encroachment is authorized pursuant to an Encroachment Permit and the Encroachment Permit does not provide otherwise, the District shall, at the District's expense, restore the activity or condition in kind.
 - 11.3 Unauthorized Encroachments. Unauthorized encroachments shall be permanently removed by the property owner and/or other responsible person and shall not be restored. Removal shall be performed promptly by and at the expense of the property owner/responsible parties. If the encroachment has not been removed within a reasonable time after notice has been given by the District, or if the urgency of the District's easement activities requires that the activities be

commenced without prior notice, the District may remove the encroachment itself, but the removal costs shall be charged back to the property owner/responsible party.

- 12. <u>District Remedies.</u> Remedies granted to the District in this Ordinance are in addition to any other rights and remedies which are available under this Ordinance or which are otherwise afforded by law, and the District is entitled to exercise any and all such rights and remedies, either serially or cumulatively, as determined by the District.
- 13. Request for Relief by Affected Persons. Any person who contends that his/her/its rights have been adversely affected by any action of or failure to act by the District in connection with the provisions of this Ordinance, may seek relief from the District under such rules and procedures as the District shall establish.
- 14. <u>Superseding Effect.</u> This Ordinance supersedes Ordinance No. 1726-1299 and all other previous and currently existing regulations which are in conflict with its provisions, and all such regulations are rescinded and repealed as of the date this Ordinance becomes effective.
- 15. <u>CEQA.</u> In accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA"), Public Resources Code sec. 21000 et seq. and the regulations promulgated pursuant to CEQA ("the State Guidelines"), the Board of Directors finds that this Ordinance is not a "project" within the meaning of the Act or the State Guidelines.
- 16. <u>Effective Date.</u> Upon adoption, this Ordinance shall be entered in the minutes of the Board and shall be published in the El Cerrito Journal promptly following its passage and adoption, and this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force and effect immediately upon the expiration of the week of publication.

The property is a 156 multi-family unit apartment complex. The property to date has not received its temporary certificate of occupancy, and moreover, is physically disconnected from the sanitary sewer main due to continuing utility conflicts by AT&T and PG&E along San Pablo Avenue.


